Letter from the Vicar, Rev'd Philip Johnson

Dust thou art and to dust thou shalt return: repent of your sins and turn to Christ. These are the words (slightly modified for modern language services) that are used on Ash Wednesday at the imposition of ashes. I prefer the old form of words as it is more direct and declamatory - Dust thou art – carrying much more force than the modern 'Remember that you are dust'. Whether we are encouraged to remember what we are or simply being told, the point is the same: we are creatures of the earth. Our origin is located in the Garden of Eden and the story of creation, of Adam (literally, the muddy creature, in Hebrew) made from mud. We are also reminded of the ultimate destination of the mortal remains of our human bodies in a condensed version of words from the burial service: earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust. Nine words sum up the span of human existence: from the cradle to the grave. The following eight words describe how we should live or life from the cradle to the grave - repent of our sins and turn to

Christ.

The story of our origin is also a story of the human condition – our general disobedience and our desire to always put oneself first. It is those common human traits that find Adam & Eve creating a life for themselves outside of the Garden and the beginning of the pilgrimage to find a way back to God. At our baptism we are marked with the sign of the cross on our forehead. We are told that 'Christ claims us for his own'; we become part of the family / church of God, we are washed and made clean, we are renewed in his image. On Ash Wednesday ashes are mixed into oil, and a cross is traced on our foreheads in the same place as the cross that was imposed at our baptism. Now the cross is a dirty smudge. It is a powerful symbol of how badly we have marred the image of God in us.

Every week before receiving communion we recite a general confession, reflecting on those things which we have done that we ought not to have done and those things that we have not done which we ought to have done. Lent is an opportunity for a deeper examination of ourselves. With our car, it is useful to regularly check the oil and water, tyre pressure etc, but that is no substitute for a full service by an experienced mechanic. Lent I, if you like, our annual full service, an MOT of our spiritual life, so that we can approach easter spiritually renewed and some of that which marred the image of God in us. dealt with and removed so that we are better able to reflect God's light into this dark world. Market Place

The new aspect of the Market Place is now in situ and, on the face of it, does look a lot better than the old market layout. In collaboration with the Hub, the local authority have thus far organised two events within the Market Place and St Denys has provided refreshments during these occasions. Roof

Now that the churchyard fence and Lady Chapel repairs have been completed we can move onto the items marked "urgent" in the QI report. There are a few issues with the nave and south transept roofs and these will be addressed during the next few months.

Pew kneelers

During February we were able to clear the pew kneelers of the fabric which was becoming very dirty and long past its sell by date. In fact most of the fabric simply peeled away with a single swipe. Historic patching and taping were becoming a trip hazard and we were made aware of the decrepit condition of the filler material. All kneelers have been given two coats of wood-preservative varnish.

Looking forward to Easter

Holy Week and Easter (13-20 April) will be slightly different this year. None of the usual services are affected but many of them will be led by the Bishop of Grantham, the Rt Revd Dr Nicholas Chamberlain. The Bishop is no stranger to St Denys, though it has been a while since he last led any of our services. We welcome Nicholas to Sleaford and St Denys in particular and trust we are able to allow him typical St Denys hospitality. Also, on 6th April the Archdeacon of Lincoln, the Venerable Gavin Kirk, will be

leading our Sunday morning service.

Our Oldest Burial?

Margaret Catelyn of Quarrington made her will on 14th March, 1463, giving a bequest to St Denys's. One witness and executor was John Bowyer, our vicar 1432-1467. She also mentions her son, Thomas, 'chaplain of Sleaford church', who receives 'her tenement in Quarringtonbetween a tenement of Wm. Sleford of Kirkby Laythorp gent, on the north, and a tenement of Thos. Scammilby on the south.

Was Thomas the assistant curate /

The Collect for Ash Wednesday (Book of Common Prayer)

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all them that are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

the chaplain of one of the chapels e.g. Holy Trinity, St Mary or St Christopher?

Margaret directed that she was 'to be buried in the Churchyard of St. Dionisius, New Lafford'.

Her will was 'proved at Sleaford Castle, 24 April 1464', probably by the Bishop of Lincoln, John Chadworth. As yet, the site is unknown, but it seems this evidence is perhaps the first indication of a named burial at St Denys's.

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William Alvey School Bishop's Visitor Update

School returned from holiday this week. Now we begin the run-up towards Easter. As well as writing these monthly items for St Denys Bulletin to keep you, the church congregation, informed about what is happening in our church school, I also often write an item for the school newsletter called the Wasp, which goes online on the school website weekly in term time for parents and others with connections to the school. There is always a weekly contribution from the Headteacher and other news about what is going on in school and the children's activities. Here are some recent examples.

We heard that the Reception children (aged 4/5) – the youngest in school – had been learning about "people who help us" and had had visits from the police, a nurse and also about what happens to letters we post. They also went to visit Cogglesford Mill to see grain being turned into flour for baking bread which they had then had a try at making in the classroom!

Year 1(aged5/6) had visited Lincoln Castle as part of their learning about life in times past and the various jobs which people would have had to do to keep everything running smoothly for all who lived there – history to us!

together and the staff are there to help and guide them every moment of the school day. In Y4(aged 8/9) they had been considering the problems we have with litter in the town and local area and they wrote letters to the Town Council with suggestions about how to tackle this. They also created posters encouraging all to take care and dispose of their litter correctly. The Town Council had been suitably impressed and you may well see some of the posters around town in future! These examples give you a small taste of what happens in school day by day and week by week. The children learn and grow.

Exultant now, o'er artwork seas.


