### Letter from the Vicar, Rev'd Philip Johnson

In some places on Ascension Day the choir will climb the tower to sing an Ascension Day Carol or Motet. This is perhaps more common in places like Oxford or Cambridge, and it does require a tower! Our spire, grand as it is, does not provide the flat space protected by battlements, with easy access that you get with a tower. In some places this tradition is marked in the early morning (7.30 or 8.00 am) in other places it is sung at noon. St John's College, Cambridge has been known to take a brass quintet up the tower with the choir to augment their joyous caroling.

Although it always falls on a Thursday, Ascension is one of the most important days in the Church's year (rather like Ash Wednesday or Good Friday).

The disciples are left on a mountain top looking up

into heaven and as a choir sings out from the tower our eyes are instinctively drawn skywards to see where the singing is coming from.

It is true that the disciples could not stay on the mountain top they had to return to 'normal' life - but something significant had happened. They had been told that Jesus would return in the same way that he had left them and as a result they lived the rest of their lives with their eyes looking heavenward, metaphorically speaking.

It can be so easy for us to get bogged down in the things of this world that we fail to lift our eyes heavenward. The news can be fairly depressing at times and illness or anxiety can dominate our thoughts. Lifting our eyes heavenwards can


change our perspective. It can take us out of ourselves and enable us to see things differently. Last week I went on a short walk to get some space and time for

reflection. First I heard the distinctive birdcall and as I lifted my eyes I watching the enchanting dance of two lapwings looping in the air.

It was a precious moment of beauty that I was privileged to watch, and in that moment I could think of nothing other than the lapwings. I completed the walk in a completely different frame of mind, giving thanks to God for the beauty of the world in which we live. Ascensiontide reminds us that we need to lift our eyes away from the things of this world that weight us down and look towards he heavens and give thanks to God for

### Vicar's Vestry (formally known as Top Vestry)

During April the Vicar's Vestry was redecorated allowing us the opportunity to re-evaluate the layout of various pieces of furniture. After careful consideration much of the furniture has been repositioned and consequently everything is better positioned to allow for more logical storage use. It will take time for those who use the vestry to familiarise themselves where items are kept but the overall emphasis is achieving a more efficient and user-friendly storage space. It is our intention to carpet the floor and this will most likely happen within the next few weeks. Lady Chapel roof and floor area The repairs to the roof area have now been completed and as a result we can concentrate on repairing the floor area where some of the supporting joists have

**A Closer Look** 

### NEGLECTED(?) NORTH AISLE

#### from Douglas Hoare

Most people attending services in our church tend not to see the north aisle. However, there is much of interest therein.

- 1. As mentioned in a previous article, there is the evidence of a change of plans when one presumes, the transept was added around 1380(?).
- 2. St. Mary's Chantry: founded in 1271 at the east end before the transept was built and owned at least 89 plots of land locally (We know who the donors were and details of its services). In the floor are two clearly expensive graveslabs. (Further east is the black and white marble tomb of a Robert Carre, died 1682, and the famous coffin lid of Yvette de Rouceby.)
- 3. Ends of six metal bars in the floor (3x2): were they part of a screen or of a pillar supporting the north gallery?

become insecure. A contractor has been instructed to undertake the floor repairs and once these have been completed a decision on how to cover the floor area will be made. Hopefully, the Lady Chapel will be open to public worship and general use during the summer months. Market Place Following an earlier meeting with representatives from North Kesteven District Council (NKDC) we are awaiting further notification and advice of how to manage access to the church when the Market Place is being redeveloped. NKDC have indicated work on the Market Place will commence on 19 July and should be completed by mid-December 2024. NKDC have shown a willingness to work alongside us with regard to how these works will affect the church and it is intended discussions will take place during May/July.



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### William Alvey School Bishop's Visitor Update

Since the middle of April we have been back in school for the new term.

I have taken the Reredos Book which is kept on the High Altar to school, to show to Mr Farrington, the Head-teacher, as it was made before his time at the school and he had not had a chance to read and look at it until now. It was a project by a small group of Y5s (aged 9/10) in 2017/18 with myself and the previous Head and input from Douglas Hoare (our resident historian!) Some slight details of information have been added and the contact details for the school up-dated. It is now back where it belongs.

If you have never looked at it, it is an explanation and history of the pictures along the High Altar of Jesus and the disciples set in the Lincolnshire landscape. Well worth a look!

We have had some more assemblies of "ow", "wow" and "now" moments from children including the history of the growth of ladies football and clips from the Lionesses World Cup victory! We've also had some more children (one from each year group) recommended for Sleaford Rotary citizens awards certificates and badges. Some amazing stories of what the children have achieved and have been rewarded for. Recently I went to a regional Meeting of Bishop's Visitors from


### **COMMUNICANTS' GUILD**
