# Letter from the Vicar, Rev'd Philip Johnson

A few weeks ago, I went to our local garden centre (well, the butchers inside the centre, to be precise). On my journey through the store I encountered huge snowmen, singing reindeers, and a brass band playing carols. At night the store is a blaze of festive light. I must admit that although many are no doubt encouraged by all of this to buy decorations for their homes and workplaces, it does not have that effect on me. I feel a bit sorry for the staff who (in my opinion) must endure three months of faux festive jollity. I suspect that when Christmas finally does arrive, they are only too glad to pack it all away and return to 'normality'.

This long commercial Christmas does not make me feel very Christmassy', if that is a word. In fact, it probably has the opposite effect to the one intended. You might, by this stage, imagine that I am the clerical version of Ebenezer Scrooge, thinking that all festive jollity is bahhumbug. And in some respects, you might be right! However, somewhere during December a change occurs.

Throughout December I will be present at numerous concerts in the church, and I will lead many carol services. We are fortunate that so many of the schools in the town want to hold a carol service in the church. It is normally at one of these school carol services that the gear shift from Scrooge to Christmas joy occurs.

Most years, the close harmony group from St George's, perform a song called 'Mary, did you know?' It was written in 1984 by Mark Lowry, but the recording by the group Pentatonix made it more widely known. The song, as the title suggests, takes us through the life of Jesus, asking Marv, if she knew he would do these things: The blind will see/The deaf will hear;/The dead will live again!/The lame will leap/The dumb will speak/The praises of the Lamb!

The song asks Mary if she realises that when she kisses her little baby that she has kissed the face of God. It is a powerful image that, for me, cuts

through the faux jollity of Jingle-Bells and the Twelve Days of Christmas. This line always has a powerful effect on me, in much the same way as the final verse of O Come all ye faithful. In David Wilcock's arrangement, the mighty chord on WORD which sets us up to sing 'now in flesh appearing', never fails to send shivers down my spine. But the common theme in these two pieces of music is that they bring us face-to-face with the reality of the incarnation: God with us - Immanuel in the Hebrew language.

Without the incarnation Christmas is nothing. The lights, trees, decorations. food, jolly music might bring a bit of fun into the dark winter months, but ultimately there is nothing to satisfy humanities greatest longings. True joy can only be found when we acknowledge the gift of God's love in the face of his son - the babe of Bethlehem.

## 2025 and all that

The following is a small selection of work carried out within St Denys during 2025.

**Jan:** Mid-week Holy Communion re-introduced in the Lady Chapel following extensive repairs to the floor area

**Feb:** Kneelers in the nave had soft coverings removed and stained throughout.

**Mar:** Full electrical inspection carried out within the church building.

**Apr:** Church gutters cleared of all winter debris. **May:** Arrangements agreed for film crew to use the church for shooting a film relating to the local community.

**Jun:** Visitation service held in St Denys. At this service all elected Churchwardens within the surrounding churches are sworn in by the Archdeacon.

**Jul:** Remedial work carried out on the nave, north and south transept roofs.

**Aug:** New heating system installed in the main hall of Parish Centre.

**Sep:** Serious water ingress in the choir vestry due to a blocked gully (twice).

**Oct:** Public notice displayed relating to a faculty application. The application concerns fixing a door within the church to create a secure storage area for storing TV screens.

**Nov:** Grass area and flower beds in front of west doors tidied up.

**Dec:** Various funds raising events as outlined above under Fundraising.

# The Third Imp? by Douglas Hoare

Last month there was an item on Look North, 'The day the devil's lesser-known imp was petrified'. The Lincoln Imp's legend is well-known. But tour guide, Emma Lingard, says, 'His lesser know accomplice, reputed to be a twin, was just as 'mischievous'. When the angels told him to stop, he cheekily replied 'stop me if you can.....' The imp, who was said to be terrified (by the angels), fled to Grimsby (Minster) 'where 'a fire ravaged the church'.

'In the aftermath of the fire, the imp was 'severely spanked' and imprisoned, before being turned to stone..... The Grimsby Imp is portrayed holding his sore bottom as proof the angel spanked him.'

At St. Denys's, in the (right) arcade second from west end (S8) is a carving very much like the Grimsby 'imp'. He too, ' is portrayed holding his sore bottom'. Do we, perhaps, have a third imp who fled from the Cathedral and, for his pains, was turned to stone and set where he lurks today?

# William Alvey School Bishop's Visitor Update

November has seen a variety of Assembly topics. Just before Bonfire Night we heard the story of Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plotters and the children were encouraged to stay safe if they went to a fireworks event.

On Armistice Day we heard about who and what we remember and why we have the Silence. We heard the Last Post and Reveille and why we hear those. The music was Elgar's Nimrod Variation and the children were asked to think about how it made them feel listening to it. Then we had our own Silence. The back wall of the hall had been decorated with poppies made by the children with a silhouette of a Lancaster bomber. The poppies looked like they were falling from the sky from the back of the plane. It was a very moving sight to see.

Another time we had visitors from the Rotary Club who presented badges and certificates to Rainbow Stars (one from each year group) who had been recommended for their acts of kindness to others. The parents of those children also attended the event and photos were taken afterwards.

The Prayer Space has been recently refreshed and updated with a Prayer Tree on which prayers can be hung. The theme of the display is world faiths reflecting the fact that the school, like the world, has children of other faiths as well as Christianity.
